JUNIOR CHURCH

“Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name
welcomes me.”

Mark Chapter 9 verse 37

Once again Junior Church has had a busy and eventful year. The members of Junior Church have not just grown taller but constantly surprise the adults with their insight and knowledge.

The children continue to contribute in a number of ways to the 10.30 Service. They pray, read the Bible and show their craft. Two of our younger members are now confidently reading Scripture verses and passages. One of my greatest joys is the way in which the older and younger members of the Church relate to each other in the Services reflecting the joy of the family bond we share in Christ.

The Nativity Play as always is a particular highlight of the year with members of both the Junior Church and the 9.00 am service presenting the birth of Jesus with a very special guest appearance from Dr. What. The older children led the Nativity from a modern perspective while the younger ones presented the more traditional view.

The children decorated a Christmas tree in keeping with the theme of travelling to Bethlehem for the Christmas Fayre. Hidden within the tree were all the key players in the Christmas Narrative. The children incorporated flags from countries which they had associations with into their tree and highlighted the plight of many modern refugees and Christians fleeing from persecution.

In December and March the Children’s Craft activities were well attended by both the Children who attend Broad Street regularly and guests. The aim of these mornings was to have lots of fun while highlighting the real meaning of Christmas and Easter.

Every week I am astounded at how hard the children work in all the activities, both those of a light hearted nature such as the Biblically themed games and crafts, and in the more challenging aspects of studying the Scripture and praying. Some of the topics we have covered this year include, in the Old Testament, an extensive examination of the lives of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph, sections of Proverbs and Psalms. In the New Testament the children have learned about the parables and miracles of Jesus, his resurrection and ascension, the coming of the Holy Spirit and the Trinity. Future topics the children will be studying will be the book of Jonah, the life of Jesus in Matthew's Gospel and some Biblical characters such as John the Baptist, Barnabas, Apollos and Timothy.

Once again may I say what a joy and privilege it is to work with our inspiring children and young people. I would also like to thank all the leaders of Junior Church who are always faithful and willing to help with all aspects of Junior Church Life, and especially to those who stepped into the breach when I was ill. Finally may I thank all Church Members and Friends who encourage, listen to, support and most importantly pray for our Junior Church.

However at the December Church Council a definite date was decided upon. This was to be Palm Sunday with an afternoon tea followed by an evening service with communion. During the service various 'symbols' of the church were handed over to a circuit steward. At the end of the service Rev Frances Ballantyne carried a lighted candle to the back of the church before blowing it out. Easter Sunday was indeed a 'resurrection day'

when we began our 'new faith journey' with our friends at Broad St; with a communion service.

During the last few months at St. Thomas Rd some of our number were called to glory:- Isobel Pollard in October, Ella Culpin in January and Audrey Ilsley in February.

We have also sent £250 to Christian Hope International (collected from our tea/coffee money and donations). This was the first charity we knitted for but getting the goods to Romford proved difficult after the chairman's daughter moved from Weston.

We're always pleased to see new faces at the group - just come for tea/coffee and a natter if you don't want to knit.

We are now a strong team of stewards, welcoming Yvonne and Joan at Easter, we appreciate their many years experience.

I don't know if everyone knows who the stewards are, most of us are around each Sunday. Please don't hesitate to speak to any one of us if you have any questions or comments about anything.

The stewards are Dorothy, Alan, Heather, Jackie, Lynn, Pawel, Jess, Yvonne and Joan. Bryn is stepping down to do other things and we thank him for helping us out.

Please feel free to have coffee after the morning service in the church; we are aware it can get a little noisy in the lounge with everyone chatting together.

If you feel you have new ideas and fresh energy, please speak to us about what being a steward entails. We all work together as a team sharing different strengths. We meet regularly with Rev Frances to discuss church life.

We all look forward with anticipation on a Sunday morning when Junior Church return from their time together to recount what they have been doing. We are all amazed by what they achieve in such a short time together. We commend Jackie and her helpers.

Finally thank you to all the stewards and others who help on a Sunday morning to make everything run smoothly, whether it is on the door, welcoming people, giving out hymn books, making coffee and doing the sound, particularly Brian who can and does turn his hands to any problem that may arise.

TREASURER'S REPORT

You will find the Total Funds held and the Income and Expenditure figures for the main Church account and for the Vision 21 account in this Church Annual Report. These show that we finished our financial year with a small surplus of £597.39 on the year which makes our balance in the main account of £31,669.09 to carry forward.

A closer look at the main account figures shows that our actual income received was considerably over budget by nearly £10k, largely because the level of donations received and the income

from hiring of rooms both exceeded expectations. Thank you for your generosity and thank you to Alan Moden for all the work he does as our lettings manager.

When we look at the expenditure side of things you can see that the amount spent was also about £10k over budget which is not so good! Gas and electricity bills continue to rise as do the cost of repair and renewal. We were extremely grateful for an anonymous donation which covered the cost of the relaying of the paving stones outside our buildings which, along with the tubs and flower baskets have made a big difference to the appearance of our property. It is hoped that when the renovation part of the Vision21 project is completed these major expenses will reduce considerably.

Turning now to Vision21, the figures show the comparison with those figures for 2016-7 when we had major fund raising efforts and also major building expenses, giving us the church we have today. Both income and expenditure are down as would be expected - we were in a quiet period before the kitchen refurbishment started (May 2018 - now completed). There is still a considerable amount of work to be carried out to complete the Vision - this will not be cheap! We need to continue fund raising and seeking grants to realise our ambition. At the end of August 2017 the balance of V21 fund was £73916.09 from which we have paid for the work in the kitchen and Hall. Thanks to grants, donations, bequests and some sterling fund raising, the account stands at around £76k today - healthy but we have great aspirations!

This is my final report as Church Treasurer. I started in a small way as Gift Aid administrator in the late 1990's and 'progressed' to treasurer in 2002/3. Thank you for trusting me to look after the church finances at Broad Street - over the years it has been an interesting and at times challenging role.

I can't finish this without a heartfelt Thank You to Jacqui Marr for all the work she has done to help me keep the accounts, for patiently answering my questions, providing me with coffee and making sure that everything was done properly and on time - without her support I would have given up years ago!

PROPERTY & FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Property and Finance Committee endeavours to oversee the general maintenance and safety of our premises as well as seeking to take forward further improvements in line with our Vision21 project.

We do have large premises and a number of regular tasks need to be carried out so that it is maintained to the highest standard and remains a safe, comfortable and welcoming environment for all the activities that are undertaken here. Our building is one of the tools that we can use to further our mission of making God's love known and we do need to keep it in good order.

Therefore, thanks need to be expressed to all those who play a part in the regular day to day, week to week maintenance as well as the willing volunteers who come along to take part in the 'working parties' when we carry out various tasks such as painting, dusting, changing lights, weeding, minor repairs and anything else that needs doing. We are fortunate to have people with specific skills and talents who are willing to use them in our Church and so reduce the costs that would otherwise be incurred if the jobs had to be done by outside contractors. Thanks to them all – your work is much appreciated and valued.

It is important that we do have enough volunteers for both the regular tasks and the working parties so that we don't leave more and more to be done by the same few people. So please consider whether you can help in some small way by responding positively to the appeals that appear in the notices from time to time and so you can play a part in maintaining our premises in such a way as to show our commitment to God's work in this place.

The last year has seen some major work carried out in the Hall and Kitchen. We now have a smart, renovated kitchen with a new cooker, a freshly sealed and smooth hall floor with a new carpet for the Children's Area as well as reconfigured storage in, and new door to, the Blue Room – no longer blue! All of this cost a significant amount of money but our Hall and Kitchen are one of the main areas used by members of our community and need to be as welcoming, accessible and safe as possible. We look forward to the time when we can get on and decorate the hall so that the walls match the smart look of the kitchen, 'Blue Room' and floor!

We also had the new heat curtain installed at the entrance to the Church Lounge. Many have commented positively on the difference it has made when entering the Church. It has certainly helped to make our welcome warm! Thanks to those who spent time planning and installing it in their own time so that the cost to the Church was smaller than it would have been if we had had to get a firm in to do it.

We need to express our thanks to the members of the Property and Finance Committee who planned, oversaw and worked hard to ensure that these improvements were carried out with so little disruption to the life and work of the Church. Thanks also to those who made financial contributions to the cost of the cooker and other items that were purchased.

However, there are things that need to be done.

In the next few months we intend to:

- Replace the water heater in the kitchen with a more modern one.
- Install sound and loop systems in the Hall and Fellowship Room and look at what might be done to put in the Church Lounge.

Both of these tasks will be carried out by our skilled volunteers so thanks to them for the work they are about to undertake.

We are also in the process of planning for the next major development on our journey in bringing to fulfilment our Vision21 plans for the premises. Hopefully, in the autumn – subject to funds being available – we will be able to give the go-ahead for the development of the area between the Church and Hall. Work would begin in 2019.

How much we can do will depend upon the monies available and we may be making an appeal for funds at some point. But this next stage - creating a new entrance and roof over the space between the Church and Hall, renovating the toilets etc. - would be a great improvement to the premises and make our building even more welcoming and accessible to all. So watch this space.

(More) exciting times ahead! Let us embrace them and together move forward.

I end this report with the words used before:

We have to look for ways to use our premises to the glory of God and as a way to serve our community and enhance our own faith and fellowship. Vision21 has never been just about the building work but also our worship, fellowship and mission. We must, as

God's people, spend as much time and effort on our relationships with God, each other and the wider community as we do on our buildings – so in the days ahead we need to think about how we move forward as the people of God in terms of our discipleship and fulfilling our mission.

Thanks to everyone for their support over the past years and, in advance, for the future support that will be given.
