I cannot end this report without mentioning how grateful we are to Phil Callow and his team, for installing a digital connection at Broad Street, so we can meet in church again. The Broad Street website has also provided almost a weekly news magazine with updates, so someone else was also on a sharp learning curve. Thank you.

For the commitment of those who have given more of their time to ensure the other, their church friend, even their neighbour, realized how much they were valued as being made in the image of God, and part of our church family, another Thank you....

We are all thankful, but still concerned as we are in a transitional stage as we start to emerge back into corporate church life again, slowly, surely, steadfastly.

Let's remember the covenant prayer, let's remember God's covenant to us...

Mission and Worship at Broad Street

9am Informal Worship

All are welcome to attend the 9am service on a Sunday morning. This is a relaxed, informal, all-age worship. The service is often interactive and the children who are present enjoy their own sessions of learning in the lounge. Ministers, local preachers, worship leaders and speakers from other Churches all lead this service.

As part of the informal worship, we hold a Breakfast Fellowship regularly throughout the year, usually on the second Sunday of the month. It offers an opportunity for all those linked to the church in any way to spend an informal time together from 9am sharing news and conversations while enjoying a variety of breakfast dishes including cereal, toast and, of course, bacon butties.

We usually then have a short time together singing, listening to a thought or reflection of the day and prayers led by a variety of different people from within the Church family. Activities are also provided for the children.

With lockdown we needed to look at a different way in which we might continue to worship, and breakfast, together. To this end, the informal worship was moved on line, using Microsoft Teams. Broad Street Digital Service was born, continues to meet virtually each Sunday and has seen the numbers 'logging on' grow from about 30 to begin with to around 80 by the end of July, with participants from all areas of the church at Broad Street and friends and family across the country. Breakfast Fellowship continued as part of the digital service and it was fun to see the variety of foods being eaten (with some friendly competition at times).

We look forward to being able to share breakfast and fellowship together in person rather than just via a screen.

We will look at ways in which this digital service might continue to play a part in the mission of Broad Street in the future. Thanks to all those who have played a part in making our Digital Service possible.

10.30 am Traditional worship

This service is a traditional approach to worship with organ or piano providing the music. Communion is usually celebrated on the first Sunday of the month. All are welcome and refreshments are available after the service in the adjoining coffee lounge.

6pm Evening Worship

At 6pm on a Sunday evening we have a service in the Church lounge. Around 15 people come each week. All are welcome at this peaceful time together.

10.45 am each Tuesday is our 15 minutes Shoppers' Service

JUNIOR CHURCH

The Junior Church Report, like many of the other reports this year, is one in two halves, the first prior to the advent of Covid 19 and the second the response to the lockdown.

The year began well with the members of Junior Church learning about Colossians, the parables of Jesus and in the summer holidays we looked at some Old Testament Bible heroes such as Noah and Joseph. During the Summer period it is always a pleasure to see many who attend the group while on holiday with relatives.

This Christmas was the busiest one yet! The children's Christmas Craft event which ties in with the Fayre took place on a grey and foggy morning. At first it seemed that the weather had put many off coming. However, a little later than usual we had large influx of children many of whom had been singing with the choir in the Church. It was lovely to welcome them and they enjoyed making the crafts and decorating biscuits. The attendance was the largest we have ever had.

The highlight of the year was the Nativity Service led entirely by the children of Broad Street Methodist Church. The children and parents of both the 9.00am and 10.30am Service worked incredibly hard to present the Christmas Story in a deconstructed format. Every element of the Service reflected the children and their personalities and perspective, this included the music, carol choices, plays, readings and prayers. It was beautifully done by the children. The message of the Season came across very clearly, expressed with the sense of fun and hope that our young people have.

Covid 19 and the lockdown meant that we could no longer meet in person. Each week I have sent an email to the children and their families to keep in touch and let them know that they are still part of our Church Family. I have also given the children a challenge to do based on a particular piece of Scripture. I have had some lovely responses to the emails, many of which are now on the Church website. Angelina has completed every challenge and her artistic ability is astounding!

Once again may I take this opportunity to thank all the leaders and helpers of Junior Church for their hard work, prayers, dedication and support. A big thank you too for the members of Junior Church who have made our time together so much fun and from whom I have learned so much. We may not be able to meet in person yet, but each child and young person remains in our prayers and thoughts.

As we move into the “new normal” we look to God to lead us forward.

Through Lent there was the start of the 'dressing of the cross' both within Church and in the front window, telling the story by the objects involved with the Passion of Jesus. Sadly we never got to the celebration of Easter day within Church.

Finally I'd like to mention how beautiful the stained glass windows look now they are in situ. Brian, David, Rev David Curran and one or two others have spent hours of their own time working on the windows. They look fabulous and they will be there for many years to come. Thank you.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This year has seen the amalgamation of the St. Thomas's Road accounts with Broad Street, apart from two small trusts held with TMCP which will be transferred shortly. This means that this year's figures are not completely indicative of our normal accounts.

At year end we had balances of £61,576 on the current account and £217,182 in our Vision21 Fund.

Following closure of St. Thomas's Road accounts, the £13,685 surplus has been included in this year's income figures. Offerings were also higher than expected at £47,493 (including Gift Aid) and lettings were also slightly higher. So despite an increase in expenditure we finished the year with a £25,212 surplus.

Despite this current healthy financial state, please be aware we are expecting a slight loss in this current year. This is mainly due to an extra £10,000 pledged to Circuit from the St. Thomas's Road balances.

The £217,182 in the Vision21 Fund includes £150,000 replacement scheme grant from Circuit. This is money that has been retained locally from the sale of St. Thomas's Road. Gifts and fund raising was £8,200 for the year. Thanks again to the hard working Fund Raising Group for their continuing efforts.

As members know the contract for the new foyer scheme is underway at an expected cost of £229,000. Any shortfall in the Vision21 Fund to pay for this will be met from further fund raising and part of a legacy we have received. We have also, within this year, repaid the £30,000 Circuit loan that was given to assist with our cashflow during the Church refurbishment.

After many years of hard work our Vision21 project is close to realisation and our desire to have a building fit for our continuing work and worship in the local community will have reached fruition.

Finally my thanks once again to Jacqui Marr for her tremendous ‘behind the scenes’ work. I could not do this job without her monthly “number crunching”

PROPERTY & FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Property and Finance Committee endeavours to oversee the general maintenance and safety of our premises as well as seeking to take forward further improvements in line with our Vision21 project.

This year has seen some major progress in the redevelopment of our premises. Work on the new entrance and foyer began in September and, initially, went ahead smoothly. However, due to Covid-19, work had to cease for a number of weeks in Spring and there were issues with obtaining materials. Happily, construction work began again and completion is now in sight. Hopefully, we will be able to begin using the new entrance and foyer in September.

Due to Covid-19, our premises were closed for a number of weeks in accordance with Government and Methodist Church guidance. We were able to re-open for worship at the beginning of July – ensuring we were Covid-19 secure. Only the Worship Area and Church Lounge were re-opened. The Hall and other rooms remain closed due to ongoing building work but we hope to have them in use in September – subject to Covid-19 measures being in place.

The Stained Glass Windows that had been transferred from St. Thomas’ Road have now been put on display in the balcony area in Broad Street. Thanks to David Ballantyne and Brian Pearson for all they have done in ensuring that the windows are now displayed at their best.

We do have large premises and a number of regular tasks need to be carried out so that they are maintained to the highest standard and remains a safe, comfortable and welcoming environment for all the activities that are undertaken here. Our building is one of the tools that we can use to further our mission of making God's love known and we do need to keep it in good order. Therefore, thanks need to be expressed to all those who play a part in the regular day to day, week to week maintenance as well as the willing volunteers who come along to take part in the 'working parties' when we carry out various tasks such as painting, dusting, changing lights, weeding, minor repairs and anything else that needs doing. We are fortunate to have people with specific skills and talents who are willing to use them in our Church and so reduce the costs that would otherwise be incurred if the jobs had to be done by outside contractors. Thanks to them all – your work is much appreciated and valued.

It is important that we do have enough volunteers for both the regular tasks and the working parties so that we don't leave more and more to be done by the same few people. So please consider whether you can help in some small way by responding positively to the appeals that appear in the notices from time to time and so you can play a part in maintaining our premises in such a way as to show our commitment to God's work in this place.

I end this report with the words used before:

We have to look for ways to use our premises to the glory of God and as a way to serve our community and enhance our own faith and fellowship. Vision21 has never been just about the building work but also our worship, fellowship and mission. We must, as God's people, spend as much time and effort on our relationships with God, each other and the wider community as we do on our buildings – so in the days ahead we need to think about how we move forward as the people of God in terms of our discipleship and fulfilling our mission.

Thanks to everyone for their support over the past years and, in advance, for the future support that will be given.
